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Welcome



Location data has the potential to underpin huge advances in our society, improving our lives and our environment and equipping the economy to recover from the effects of Coronavirus. The Geospatial Commission is an impartial, expert committee, established within the Cabinet Office to advise the Government about how best to maximise the significant opportunities that location data and technology offer to the UK.

The Commission is responsible for providing strategic oversight of the geospatial ecosystem in the UK, setting geospatial strategy, policy and standards. It holds the budget for the public sector's largest investment in location data and works in partnership with others to make targeted investments in data projects that accelerate innovation and adoption of geospatial data applications.

In the three years since its establishment, the Commission has delivered a range of high impact policy and programme-based measures under the leadership of the former Chair, Sir Andrew Dilnot. These include: pilots for a National Underground Asset Register; signing a £1bn contract with Ordnance Survey to upgrade the UK's foundational public sector data assets over ten years; publication of the UK's first comprehensive analysis of the value of the UK's geospatial data market; and, mandating across the public sector the golden thread of housing data identifiers: unique property and unique street reference numbers.

In June 2020, the Commission published the UK Geospatial Strategy, which set out a coordinated approach to unlock economic, social and environmental value from location data. It outlines an ambitious programme of activity across four key missions:

Mission 1: Promote and safeguard the use of location data.

Mission 2: Improve access to better location data.

Mission 3: Enhance capabilities, skills and awareness.

Mission 4: Enable innovation.



We are now seeking a highly-regarded leader to join the Board of Commissioners to drive implementation of the UK government's ambitious Geospatial Strategy by providing guidance and challenge on all aspects of the Geospatial Commission's cross cutting work, including the use of location data to support Housing, Land Use, Property and Planning.

We require an experienced Non-Executive Director who will provide robust, impartial advice under a high level of public interest and scrutiny; will work closely with the Chair and wider Board members to help build consensus towards and support implementation of the UK Geospatial Strategy; and will act as a source of advice to the executive management team.

About the Geospatial Commission

The Geospatial Commission is an independent, expert committee responsible for setting the UK's geospatial strategy and coordinating public sector geospatial activity. We have a mandate and budget to drive and deliver changes by working in partnership with others.

This means we:

- Provide strategic oversight of the geospatial ecosystem in the UK, setting geospatial strategy, policy and standards.
- Hold the budget for the public sector's largest investment in geospatial data.
- Make targeted investments in data projects that accelerate innovation and adoption of geospatial data applications.

In June 2020, the Geospatial Commission published the UK's [Geospatial Strategy](#) to unlock the significant economic, social and environmental value of location data. The Strategy sets out four key missions, together with a combination of actions, serving as our blueprint for collaboration and targeted priorities.

The Commission's agenda is crucial for effective delivery of many of the government's key aims; including through supporting infrastructure delivery and construction as part of the COVID-19 economic recovery, helping to put the UK on the front foot in its transition out of the EU through further developing a technology and science capability where the UK is a recognised exemplar, and driving public sector efficiencies and reform through access to improved location data.



Job description & person specification

The Government is seeking a highly-regarded leader to join the Geospatial Commission's Board of Commissioners to drive implementation of the UK government's ambitious Geospatial Strategy.

Role: Commissioner, Board of Commissioners

Remuneration: £15,000 p.a.

Length of tenure: 2 years (one term)

Time commitment: The Board of Commissioners meets formally six times per year. There will be other commitments throughout the year to provide leadership and engagement with key stakeholders. The time commitment is therefore expected to be around 30 days per year.

Location: London (currently working from home due to Covid-19)

You will provide guidance and challenge on all aspects of the Geospatial Commission's cross cutting work, including the use of location data to support Housing, Land Use, Property and Planning. You will provide robust, impartial advice under a high level of public interest and scrutiny, using your public profile to build consensus. You will work closely with the Chair and wider Board members to support implementation of the UK Geospatial Strategy to drive investment and innovation across the UK economy and act as a source of advice and support to the executive management team.

Ongoing responsibilities:

- Providing expert, impartial advice to the government on geospatial data, including advice on prioritisation and value for money;
- Building broad cross-sector support and consensus around Commission recommendations;
- Supporting the monitoring of performance of public sector bodies responsible for delivering the Geospatial Strategy;
- Chairing Commission working groups, facilitating deep dives into priority areas via detailed, collaborative, stakeholder engagement;
- Engaging with stakeholders, including industry, government, academia, interest groups and the public;
- Representing the Commission in public, including at industry events.



Person specification

Essential:

- Experience of strategic leadership at senior levels of government, academia or business;
- A capacity to operate strategically and with influence;
- A highly-regarded leader in their field;
- An understanding of location data and its applications;
- Ability to process complex information, take a long-term view and weigh probabilities to reach clear conclusions;
- Track record of communicating and influencing at the highest levels;
- Credibility with government, the data community, industry, and the public;
- Experience of representing organisations in public, with a range of stakeholders;
- Clear communication of complex topics.

Desirable:

- An understanding of location data and its applications in the field of housing, property and planning;
- Understanding or experience of growing a company in the digital economy.

Commencement of appointment

Successful candidates would ideally be able to take up the post in July 2021.

Period of appointment

The appointment will be for an initial term of 2 years, with an option to extend further in certain cases.

Conflicts of interest

The Commission advises on issues with wide implications across the economy and society more broadly. It will be important that the Commissioner's other commitments do not cast any doubt on their ability to act independently and impartially in discharging the role; any potential conflict of interest must be declared.



Diversity & equality of opportunity

Diversity of opportunity is something the Cabinet Office cares passionately about.

Applications are encouraged from all candidates regardless of ethnicity, religion or belief, gender, sexual orientation, age, disability, gender identity. We particularly welcome applications from women, those with a disability and those from a black or ethnic minority background.

The Commissioner is required to adhere to the [Code of Conduct for Board Members of Public Bodies](#), which covers your conduct in the role and includes the [Nolan Principles of Public Life](#).

As set out by the Institute of Directors, Non-Executive Directors (NEDs) (also known in the context of Arm's Length Bodies (ALBs), as non-executive board members) are appointed to the boards of organisations to bring: independence; impartiality; wide experience; special knowledge; and personal qualities.

As a NED of a public body you should be expected to act in an independent manner bringing expertise, scrutiny and challenge and support to your organisation.

NEDs on Public Bodies should demonstrate the 12 qualities listed in the newly published guidance "12 principles of governance for all public body NEDs":
